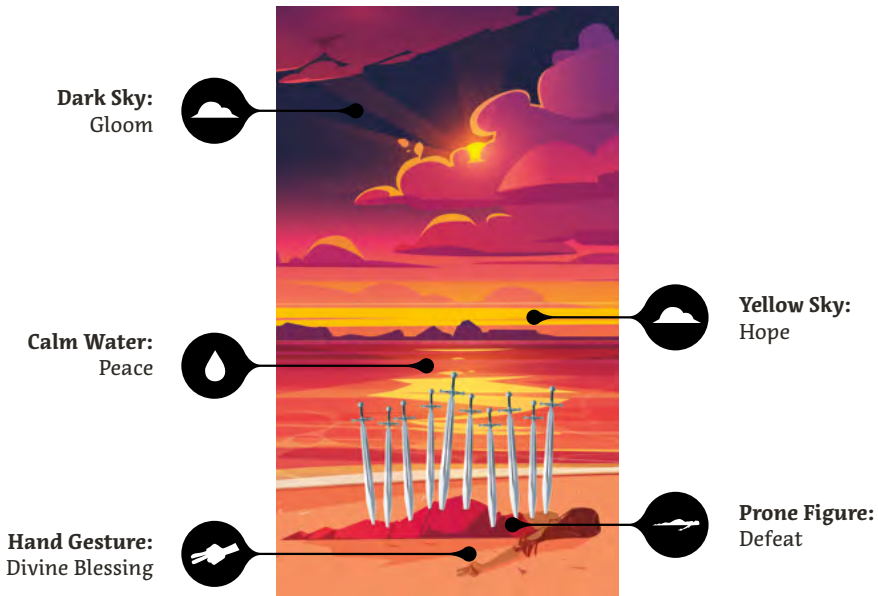

The Ten of Swords is a card of endings — often painful, sudden, and unexpected. It represents a situation that has reached rock bottom, where things seemingly can’t get worse. This card embodies betrayal, loss, or the culmination of unfortunate events.

Despite the initial gloom, this card also signals release. The worst is over, and there’s a surrender to the universe, an acceptance of what has occurred. This acknowledgment is the first step towards healing and moving forward.

While the card speaks of harsh realities, it also points out that once something has concluded, there’s space for a new beginning. It’s a reminder that after every ending comes a new dawn, even if it isn’t visible immediately.

Reversed: Recovery, Survival, Regeneration, Mending, Moving Upwards

The Ten of Swords reversed heralds a time of recovery. The darkness and pain that once seemed all-consuming begin to lift, and there’s a palpable sense of hope. The weight of past betrayals or disappointments no longer pins down the individual. Instead, there’s a newfound strength and determination to rise above.

This position often suggests a period of introspection. There’s an understanding that while one may have faced betrayals or hardships, these experiences are also teachers. It signifies the journey of processing pain, understanding its origins, and working towards preventing future heartaches.

The reversed Ten of Swords is like the first light after a long, treacherous night. While scars may remain, one realizes that one has survived the worst. It embodies the adage, “What doesn’t kill you makes you stronger.”

Upright Interpretations

General Reading: The Ten of Swords indicates a painful ending, betrayal, or the realization that a situation has reached its lowest point. It is the culmination of hardships, signaling that things cannot get worse and there's only a way up from here.

Love Reading: In love, this card can signify the end of a relationship, feeling backstabbed or deeply hurt by a partner. It's a realization that things may have come to an irrevocable end.

Health Reading: The Ten of Swords might point to feeling mentally or physically at a low point, possibly due to stress or other health complications. It's a strong indication to seek help or make necessary changes.

Career Reading: Career-wise, the Ten of Swords can suggest a significant setback, end of a job or project, or feeling betrayed in the professional sphere.

Reversed Interpretations

General Reading: This position suggests recovery and the potential for rebirth. While the pain of the past may linger, there is hope and an opportunity to rise from the ashes and move forward.

Love Reading: The Ten of Swords reversed in love could indicate the beginning of healing after a heartbreak or the chance for reconciliation. Past wounds start to heal, and there's potential for a fresh start.

Health Reading: Healing and recovery are the key themes. This might signify recuperation, improved mental well-being, or finding effective treatments.

Career Reading: There's potential for new beginnings or unexpected opportunities following a career disappointment. It indicates resilience and bouncing back after a setback.

The number ten, signifying the final stage of the suit, implies a culmination or completion of a cycle.

Frequently, the upper part of the card features a bleak or stormy sky, indicating the despair and despondency associated with this card. Nevertheless, numerous interpretations also integrate a brightening horizon or a suggestion of a sunrise in the distance — a sign of optimism and fresh starts that follow after a tumultuous time. The environment depicted is generally desolate or barren, reinforcing the themes of conclusion, emptiness, and devastation. However, this desolation can also connote a blank slate, ready for new beginnings to sprout once healing commences.



ZODIAC: Gemini (May 21 – June 20) is an Air sign ruled by Mercury. The dual nature of Gemini embodies a mix of yin and yang, and Geminis often feel as though they have two distinct sides.



Libra (September 23 – October 22) is an Air sign ruled by Venus. Libras often strive for harmony and balance in their lives.
